

### Session 1

# What Is Prayer?

Scripture Text

Luke 10:38-42

Session Theme

Being present with God.

#### Open with prayer.

Where is your favorite place to get away? What do you like about this place?

Who is your best friend? What do you like about this person? What do you have in common? How are you different from one another? How is your friendship strengthened? What things can weaken your friendship? How do you act when you are together?

The next few sessions will focus on relationships—relationships with friends, family, and God. This is a time to appreciate our friends and families, and also to focus on the importance of our relationship with God.

#### What Would You Do?

- 1. Your family has agreed to spend two years as missionaries in Africa. Your parents will leave their jobs, and you and your younger sister will leave your school. It's the end of May and you will leave for Africa in six weeks. How will you spend the next six weeks? What activities will you be doing with your friends? Will your family pray together about this situation?
- 2. Your mother is taking a new job in another city. She starts the new job in one month. She has agreed to let you stay with friends for the rest of the school year, but then you will move to the new city too. How will you spend the last three months of the school year? How do you think your mother will feel living without you for a few months? Will you pray with your mom before she leaves?
- 3. You have just been diagnosed with a terminal illness. Right now you feel pretty good, but the doctors say your health may deteriorate very quickly. Your life expectancy is uncertain. How will you spend your time with friends and family? What might you pray for?
- 4. Your father just had a heart attack and has been in and out of intensive care. If he makes it through the next two weeks, he has a good chance of a total recovery. Today you are the only family member at the hospital. How will you spend your time? Will you and your father pray together?

5. Your mom and dad have just finalized their divorce. Your dad is going to move to Texas while you stay with your mom in Wisconsin. You won't see your dad for at least nine months once he moves. Tonight he is taking you out for the last time before he leaves. How do you want to spend your time together? What things might you want to talk about? Will you pray together?	
Overall, how do these situations make you feel? What things worry you? What priorities come to mind? List the top five priorities you identified.

# Joe and the Chocolate Chips

Ask two people to perform this skit or read it aloud to the group. Then discuss the following questions as a group.

#### Characters

Joe: a 15-year-old returning home from football practice

**Mom:** busy in the kitchen, preparing a recipe for that evening

Mom: (To herself) Okay, now I need two cups of flour ...

Joe: (Enters, wearing a football uniform) Hi, Mom.

**Mom:** One cup of sugar ... (Looks up) Oh. Hi, Joe. Where are the chocolate chips I bought last week?

Joe: (Sits down) I'm exhausted. Football practice was terrible.

**Mom:** (*Distracted*) Joe, do you know where the chocolate chips went? What did you say about football practice?

Joe: I think Beth ate them last night. I said football practice was awful. Brian hit me so hard, I felt like I ran into a wall. Then I dropped the ball and the coach screamed at me. I'm afraid I won't get to play on Saturday.

**Mom:** That's too bad. Say, will you run down to the store for me and pick up some chocolate chips? I want to finish these bars before Grandpa and Grandma get here. What time is your game Saturday?

Nine o'clock. We're picking up Dennis at eight-thirty. Why can't Beth Joe: go get the chocolate chips? She ate them.

**Mom:** You know I don't want Beth biking across that busy street. The money's in my purse.

Joe: (Disappointed) Okay, I'll go. Where's your purse?

As a group, discuss the following questions:

- How do you think Joe is feeling? Why?
- How do you think Joe's mom is feeling? Why?
- What response is Joe hoping for? What response does he get?
- What things need to change in order for both Joe and his mom to feel good about this situation?
- How is this situation similar to Jesus' visit with Mary and Martha? How is this situation different?

# The Definition of Prayer

## Session 2

# The Lord's Prayer

#### Scripture Text

Luke 11:1-4

Session Theme

Jesus speaks to us.

Lord's Prayer

Luke 11:1-4

Father, hallowed be your name. Your kingdom come. Give us each day

our daily bread.

And forgive us our sins, for we ourselves forgive everyone indebted to us.

And do not bring us to the time of trial. Open with prayer.

Discuss the following questions:

- How might you act in the presence of someone you admire?
- How would you want to spend time with your favorite famous person?

God is with us whenever we pray. Whether we are alone in our room, hanging out with a group of close friends, or off in the midst of natural beauty, God promises to give us full attention. It was customary in Jesus' time for religious leaders to teach their students simple words to help them pray. The students would memorize these prayers and say them over and over each day. Jesus' disciples asked him to do the same for them.

### Scripture Discussion

Read Luke 11:1-4 and answer the following questions:

What was Jesus doing when his disciples came to him?

Why do you think Jesus might have wanted to pray?

Why might we want to pray?

How did Jesus begin his prayer? Why?

How do you greet your family or friends?

Maybe you refer to your friends with nicknames or have a nickname that certain friends call you. When those people recognize you by that name, it means something special. It's the same way with God. God wants to meet us on a personal level. We begin our prayer by addressing God as someone who is special in our lives.

# What Do We Ask for in Our Prayers?

List some things that Jesus prayed about.
Why do we pray "Your kingdom come"?
What does "Give us each day our daily bread" mean?
Why do we need to ask God for forgiveness?
Why must we forgive others?
What does "And do not bring us to the time of trial" mean?
Does Jesus' prayer request the same things from God that we might request?
What specific requests does Jesus suggest we make in our own prayers?
What are your needs today? How might God help you today?

Do you worry about things that occurred in the past? How might God relieve your stress or take away your worries?
Do you have a family relationship or friendship that needs God's attention?
What are your dreams for the future? How might God guide you in achieving your dreams?
Jesus points out three areas to focus on in our prayer life:  1. We present God with our needs for today.  2. We give God our burdens from the past.  3. We invite God into our future.
Our prayers can include our relationship with God, our family, our friends, or any other person. We can include our struggles at school, at work, at hom or any other place. Our prayers should include whatever is in our hearts or our minds. The words of the Lord's Prayer can be our only words or they can be combined or replaced with words that are real for us today.
Did Jesus intend for us to pray only this prayer? Why or why not?
Why might it be helpful for Jesus to teach us a prayer?
How can we use this prayer as a basis for a spiritual life?

Sometimes we get so involved in the details of daily life that we neglect our family or friends. Then suddenly we realize we have been so busy that we have forgotten to appreciate our relationships with others. It works the same in our relationship with God.

# Assignment

Close with prayer.

In the space below, rewrite the Lord's Prayer in your own words. Greet God in a personal, meaningful way. Ask God to help meet your needs today, to remove past hurts, and to give you guidance in the future. Think specifically about your relationship with God, with friends, and with family members. Pray your prayer once each day of the coming week.

### Session 3

# Personal Prayer

Scripture Text

Luke 11:5-13

Session Theme

How do I pray?

Open with prayer.

This session focuses on how to make prayer a part of our everyday life and a part of our self-identity. This session looks at the following questions:

- · What do we ask for in prayer?
- · How will God respond to our requests?
- Will our prayers be answered?

Imagine you have been awarded a one-hour shopping spree in your favorite store. During this hour, you can do whatever you'd like and have whatever you want.

- Which store would you pick?
- How would you feel being alone in that store?
- What would you do first?
- What would you take with you at the end of your hour?

List some gifts you have received without giving anything back in return.

How do you feel about receiving gifts and giving nothing in return?

## Scripture Discussion

Read the parable Jesus tells his disciples about prayer in Luke 11:5-13. Hospitality was very important to the people of Jesus' time. Homes were opened to travelers for food, drink, and rest. There were no fast-food restaurants or rest areas for travelers, and motels were not located at every major intersection of town. People relied on each other to meet basic needs while they were on the road.

Traveling at night was common because the sun was so hot during the day. This presented a dilemma for many travelers, because most people closed their homes at night in order to keep warm. They also baked only enough for one day at a time, and were often out of bread once night came.

The Host and the Traveler
What advice does Luke 11:5-13 offer for travelers? For hosts?
How did the traveler decide where to go for help? How did the host decide where to go for help?
What do you do when you have certain needs? Where do you go to for help?
God's Message to Us
Jesus often used a type of story, called a parable, to reinforce his teachings. But Jesus also used parables that showed the opposite of his teachings. The parable from Luke 11:5-13 is one of contrast. Jesus used the story of a persistent host begging for food from an unwilling friend in order to meet his obligation to a passing traveler. The contrast, according to Jesus, is how willing God is to listen. God never locks the door and goes to sleep, only to be awakened by our persistence. Jesus points out that even the unwilling man eventually responded to his friend.
What advice do these verses offer us about prayer?




